Inground Water and Sewer Construction

Watson Lake is on the brink of transformative infrastructure improvements that will elevate the town's liveability and economic prospects. This initiative covers critical upgrades to water, sewer, and road systems, ensuring long-term benefits for residents and businesses alike.

Investments in Essential Services

The Federal, Territorial Governments and the Town of Watson Lake are jointly investing \$8.5 million in water, sewer, and road improvements. This funding shows a commitment to enhancing services that directly impact the community's quality of life and economic stability. The federal government is contributing \$4.25 million, matched by the Yukon government with an additional \$4.25 million through the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP).

Enhancing Water and Sewer Systems

Modernizing Watson Lake's water and sewer infrastructure is a key component of this project. By upgrading aging pipelines and expanding the capacity of water treatment facilities, the town aims to ensure a reliable water supply and improve sanitation standards. These upgrades will address current deficiencies and prepare

for future growth, significantly reducing environmental risks.

Road Improvement Upgrades

The project also includes comprehensive road improvements, from sub-base to surface resurfacing, facilitating smoother traffic flow and reducing vehicle wear and tear. These enhancements will improve access for both customers and suppliers, benefiting residents and businesses alike.

Ongoing Inground Work

Currently, Norcope, the contractor overseeing the project, has deployed two crews to ensure timely completion of critical tasks. One crew focuses on Tintina Way, while the other is upgrading Adela, Frank Trail, and Stikine Avenue. Efforts are being made to minimize water service interruptions, with sewer and waterline replacements occurring separately. Norcope aims to complete these areas before temperatures drop to ensure reliable

water service for residents and businesses. Coordinating Personal Projects

A liaison has been appointed to oversee the coordination of personal projects with the broader infrastructure upgrades. This role ensures that individual initiatives align with the town's overall development plan, benefiting the entire community. Addressing Community Concerns

Some confusion and misunderstandings have arisen regarding the necessity and scope of these upgrades. The primary purpose is to replace aging infrastructure to ensure continued reliability and safety. Benefits include reduced freeze-ups, improved ditching to prevent ruts, and resurfaced roads that will enhance daily commutes, providing a more stable and convenient living environment.

Watson Lake is enhancing fire safety and community resilience with a Dry Hydrant Feasibility Study, exploring the installation of dry hydrants to ensure year-round water availability for fire trucks.

Dry Hydrants?

Dry hydrants are crucial for firefighting in cold climates, consisting of pipes installed near water bodies, allowing fire trucks to draw water efficiently.

The feasibility study identifies locations and assesses water availability in Watson Lake, ensuring a sustainable yield of 1,800 litres per minute to fill fire trucks. The study considered Wye Lake, Second Wye Lake, Hour Lake, and Watson Lake as feasible locations. This initiative is vital for improving fire-response capabilities and reducing fire-related damage. It also enhances long-term community resilience by providing a reliable, cost-effective water source for firefighting. The Dry Hydrant Feasibility Report can be found on our website, and public input is encouraged.



Housing Accelerator Funds to boost Watson Lake Development

Watson Lake is set to benefit from the recently announced Housing Accelerator Funds, a Federal Government initiative providing \$6.7 million to the Yukon to construct 1,000 homes over the next decade.

Watson Lake's Mayor Chris Irvin and Yukon MP Brendan Hanley announced an allocation of \$2,060,000 for the town's Housing Accelerator Funds' Action Plan. "With federal funding and leadership, we are changing how municipalities let housing get built in their communities," stated the federal government.

The action plan for Watson Lake encourages developing underused parcels of land and converting some commercial properties into residential units. The town's zoning bylaw will remove barriers to "missing middle" housing, defining how duplexes and townhouses are classified. The plan also addresses community barriers to accessing residential financing and aims to develop public-private partnerships for municipal service extensions.



Mayor Irvin expressed appreciation to the Government of Canada and Canada stimulate local economic growth Mortgage and Housing Corporation for the funding, which will increase the availability and affordability of housing in Watson Lake, ensuring everyone has a safe, affordable homes.

What We Heard: Sign Post Forest and Wye Lake Trail Upgrades

The Town of Watson Lake is enhancing the Wye Lake Trail and Signpost Forest Trail to promote active transportation, improve accessibility, and enrich community well-being. These upgrades aim to make the trails more enjoyable and accessible for all residents and visitors.

Project Goals

These trail upgrades aim to poor trail conditions that encourage residents to walk, bike, and use the trails for non-motorized transportation, to be used for more than just recreation. Improved accessibility ensures usability for people of all ages and abilities, including youth, seniors, and persons with disabilities. Feedback from the "What We Heard" survey highlighted the primary safety concerns due to lack

of lighting, wildlife, and discourage people from using seating, and more garbage/ them, and the fact that it is generally difficult to maintain. The upgrades aim to provide a safe and pleasant environment, increase yearround use, and enhance amenities.

From the Community

Feedback was gathered from the residents through a Town Hall meeting and an online survey in fall 2022.

According to participants, key priorities for Wye Lake Trail improvements include expanded winter access, improved trail surface, and Kaska language signage. For Signpost Forest, additional historical information, more recycling bins were requested.

Next Steps

Based on community feedback, the top priority is improving active transportation and accessibility. Construction documents are being prepared, and the project will move to the implementation phase this year.

Public Waste Drop-off Area: Watson Lake Set for Improved Waste Management

Watson Lake is nearing completion of a significant waste management project with the public waste drop-off area now 95% finished. Since Fall 2023, substantial progress has been made, allowing for new waste management procedures to be implemented soon.

A key feature of the new drop-off area is the roll-off trailers with three bin compartments, set to be installed onsite. This equipment will change waste disposal procedures in Watson Lake.

The project is progressing smoothly and is on track to meet planned

New Firefighting Techniques and Equipment Enhance Watson Lake's Fire Protection

he Watson Lake Volunteer Fire Department is enhancing its fire protection capabilities with innovative techniques and new equipment, as shared by Director of Protective Services, John Smith. In a recent interview, Smith discussed the department's advancements, including specialized training and new firefighting tools.

Urban Interface Course

The recent Wildland Urban Interface Course, led by instructors from Slave Lake, brought together 15 students from various departments in the Yukon. This course provided valuable knowledge and hands-on experience in deploying hoses and sprinklers to protect communities during wildfires. structures to ensure water

New Firefighting Methods Watson Lake Fire Department has acquired

two sprinkler unit trailers. significantly upgrading their firefighting arsenal. These trailers can quickly deploy hoses and sprinklers, creating barriers to prevent fire spread. Smith, with rescue services experience since 1999, learned new methods during this training, such as placing sprinklers around flows from homes and important areas.

in Slave Lake and Fort McMurray, these sprinkler systems have proven effective. They can protect 30-40 houses simultaneously, significantly enhancing fire protection capabilities.

Firesmart Begins at Home: How to FireSmart your property and the Wawanesa Home Sprinkler Giveaway

s wildfires in the Yukon become an increasing concern, As wildlifes in the Turkin become a dirist time to get smart about protecting our homes and community. FireSmart principles, courtesy of the Government of Yukon's Wildland Fire Management Branch, emphasize that effective wildfire prevention starts at home.

Why FireSmart?

Wildfires are a natural part of Yukon's boreal forest ecosystem, promoting diversity and providing wildlife habitat. However. as communities extend into forested areas, the risk of wildfire damage to homes and properties increases. FireSmart practices help mitigate these risks, protecting lives and property while supporting the ecosystem's natural role.

How Wildfires Spread Wildfires

airborne embers. Flammable materials like evergreen trees, dry grass, and wood piles act as fuel. Sparks and embers can travel up to two kilometers, igniting homes and structures.

How to FireSmart Zones:

It is important to create defensible spaces around your property to prevent fire spread as much as you can.

Zone 0 (0-1.5 meters): Clear vegetation and flammable materials. Use fire-resistant roofing, clean gutters, and

screen vents.

Zone 1 (1.5-10 meters): Use non-flammable landscaping materials and plants. Keep grass mowed and remove woody debris.

Zone 2 (10-30 meters): Thin and prune trees to reduce fire intensity. Remove lowhanging branches.

Zone 3 (30-100 meters): Create fire breaks by thinning and pruning vegetation.
